Brian 'n Forester both drew upon th' real life career o' several Royal Navy officers, most notably that o' Admiral Thomas Cochrane. O'Brian's fictionalizations didnae end wit' his litr'y output, yarr. Late in his life twas't come t' light that much o' wha' hae past fer his public biography was inaccurate 'n that at th' age o' 31, in 1945, he left his shorename o' Richard Patrick Russ fer thet o' Patrick O'Brian 'n severed ties wit' a previous beauty 'n sprogs. His nouvelle belle c'etait Mary Tolstoy 'twas, t'precedin' consort o' t' Count Dimitri Tolstoy, a distant cousin o' t' Russian author Leo Tolstoy.
