Released in both th' US 'n UK in 1962 ahead o'
Mutiny on th' Bounty t' less hoopla, 'n under differnt
titles - Damn the Defiant and HMS Defiant, respectively - th'
outline o' this fictional tale be somewhat like her fleetmate, but
inverted. HMS Defiant ships wit' a kind 'n effective cap'n
pitted against a sadistic 'n manipulative first mate
who drives th' crew t' mutiny.

Spithead 'n Nore Mutinies o' 1795, th' tale loots that fleetwide protest 'n attempts t' distill it t' th' experience o' a single ship. Th' Spithead Mutiny was a successful protest action taken against the Royal Navy seeking better pay and working conditions and can be seen as a precursor of Victorian and modern labor organization and resistance.

Th' good Captain Crawford be portrayed by none other than Alec Guinness, 'n his antagonist, Lieutenant Scott-Padgett, by Dirk Bogarde. Director Lewis Gilbert's precedin' career featured 1960's Sink th' Bismarck! 'n would go on t' include Alfie 'n three Bond films, includin' Moonraker. Th' film was shot off th' coast o' Spain 'n at Shepperton Studios.

Contemporary reviewers 'ave a tendency t' describe th' film as pedestrian, wit' th' exception o' th' cinematography showin' ships in combat. Fer th' film, some relatively large-scale model ships were built, 'n thar were also two real sailin' vessels employed, th' Marcel B. Surdo (previously seen here in exterior shots used fer Captain Horatio Hornblower) 'n th' Angiolina H, both built early in th' 20th century in Italy 'n previously employed in yet another 19th century naval epic, John Paul Jones.
